Last-Period Rally Carries Annandale

Marshall could not hold onto the football or Annandale's Mike Lucido last night and these oversights ended the Statemen's 10-game winning streak.

Lucido, a 175-pound tailback who is seldom stopped by a single tackler, rushed for 237 yards in 25 carries and scored two touchdowns in the 15-7 victory at Annan-

Marshall contributed to both gomery at Whitman, Carroll at scores through fumbles, one inside Annandale's and High Point at Good Coun-five-yard line late in the Virginia AAA nondistrict game. The weekend schedule, with The Statesmen bobbled away the ball four times in all, enough to stall the high-powered offense that brought them the Northern Region title last year.

It was a sweet victory for Atoms' coach Bob Hardage, a former quarterback and assistant coach under Marshall head man Ed Henry. Marshall beat Annandale, 12-7, in the 1970 season opener.

Annandale loosened up a scoreless game early in the third period after recovering a fumble by Marshall on a punt. Lucido went the final four yards of the 40-yard drive to make it 6-0.

Marshall kept it interesting by taking the kickoff and going 71 yards to move ahead, 7-6. Jay McKeever got the touchdown on a 13-yard scamper.

Annandale came right back behind junior quarterback Pete Conaty, who started the second half. Conaty completed two passes for 36 yards and Lucido ripped off a 20yard run to set up a 23-yard field goal by Brian Grainer with 10:05 left in the game.

A fumble by Al Boudreau, who gained 138 yards, stopped Marshall on a third-down play from Annandale's 13. The Atoms recovered on the four and then five plays later, Lucido broke off tackle and raced 79 yards for the final score.

Annandale rushed for 253 yards, 170 in the second half when Lucido picked up 148. Marshall had 211 yards on the ground. The teams threw only 11 passes in all.

Lucido Leads Atoms Dver Marshall. 15-7

Sept 10, 1971 79-Yard Run Is Decisive

ANNANDALE - Mike Lucido, who led Annandale's ball carriers as a freshman last year, got off to a rousing start in his sophomore season last night as he led the Atoms to a surprising 15-7 victory over Marshall at Annandale.

Marshall, the defending Northern Region champion, took a 7-6 lead into the fourth quarter but that was short-lived as Lucido got his team rolling in the final period and gained most of the yardage as the Atoms scored a touchdown and field goal to win the game.

The teams spent all of the first half in the middle of the field before the Atoms broke the ice early in the third quarter.

Lucido scored the touchdown from three yards out to cap a 70-yard drive following the second half kickoff. Junior quarterback Pete Conaty featured the drive with a 25-yard pass play to Kerry Mullin that took the ball to the Marshall 35.

Marshall scored late in the quarter on a one-vard run by McKeever and Flynn kicked the extra point to give the State men a 7-6 lead.

Brian Grainer put the Atoms ahead with a 10-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter and Lucido capped the action with a 79-yard touchdown run. Lucido gained close to 250-yards in the game and led all rushers and ground gainers.
