

# Marshall Defeats

## Jags, 7-0

*Sept 8, 1972*  
FALLS CHURCH — Marshall's Statesmen ruled the ground while surrendering the air but managed to hold on for a 7-0 victory over Falls Church in a non-district AAA contest at Falls Church last night.

Falls Church quarterback Lyle Hayhurst completed 17 of 38 passes for 200 yards but Marshall made a second quarter touchdown stand up for the victory.

The Jaguars, who gained only 51 yards on the ground, threatened three times in the final quarter, the last time running out of gas on the Marshall four with two minutes remaining.

Marshall turned one of Hayhurst's passes into its only touchdown when Mike Atalla intercepted him at the Falls Church 21 midway in the second quarter.

In four plays Marshall took the ball to the 2 from where Peyton Bailey carried it across for the score. Blair Flynn kicked the extra point. The big play in the drive was a six-yard scamper by Mark Bendorff that put the ball at the 2.

Falls Church drove from mid-field where the Jaguars gained possession on an exchange of punts. They moved to the 4 when a fourth-down pass by Hayhurst went incomplete, giving Marshall the ball on the four with 1:30 remaining.

Marshall gained 179 yards and added 14 in the air on three completions in seven attempts.

# It's Fundamentals for Marshall After Win Over Falls Church

Coach Ed Henry is having his team work on the basic fundamentals of football this week as they prepare for their second game of the season against Edison.

"We've got a long way to go," said Henry. "We just made too many errors last week in blocking and other fundamental parts of the game. Of course that's to be expected with a lot of guys starting for the first time."

If Coach Henry sounds a little pessimistic it isn't entirely justified. His Statesmen were able to hold off Falls Church last week for a 7-0 win.

"We're happy to take the victory. Our kids played most of the second half on defense and most of the final quarter with Falls Church in our territory," said Henry. "It's a credit to them that they didn't crack. They really were under a lot of pressure."

"We were a little unhappy with our pass defense Friday night but after looking at the films we have to credit Falls Church with a superior passing game. If they throw all season like they did against us they will have the finest passing at-

tack in their district. They don't do a lot of things but what they do they do well."

Edison, a 40-0 loser in the opener against Woodson, should be a breeze for Marshall, right? "No!" says Coach Henry. "They had a bad opener but they've got a good coach and they will be making some adjustments. Essentially all that game will do is make our scouting report worthless. It just takes some teams a little longer to get ready for a season. Last week's weakness could very well not be there next game."

Does Henry really expect a tough game? "We just don't have the physical size to walk away with any game this year. We're going to be up against it every time we go onto the field." We don't have the talent to let up at all."

Henry pinpoints Peyton Bailey as the offensive standout of last week's game. "He's not as big as some of the runners in the area but he is every bit as talented. He is a rough sonovagun. He is one of the best blockers that I have ever coached and is real tough when he gets inside the ten." Bailey,

a junior, gained 106 yards against Falls Church.

Junior linebacker Jim Day was picked by Henry as the outstanding defensive player of the game. "We had him playing tackle and moved him almost at the last minute to linebacker. He only had three days practice at the position and really did an outstanding job. He is going to be a great one."

Any new wrinkles to be put into the game coming up? "We have got to pass the ball more. We played a very conservative game against Falls Church. We have to have a more balanced attack," says Henry. He adds that they may be forced to play a more conservative game because of his personnel. "We just don't have anybody that can break a game wide open. We've got young players in key positions. We've got a sophomore starting in our backfield. He's a fine athlete and will do a good job but we would like to be able to bring him along a little more slowly."

Marshall will meet Edison at home Friday night.
