An overflow crowd of nearly 10,000 saw Falls Church score in every quarter and top Marshall, 25-15, in a Virginia AAA League nondistrict game at Falls Church last night.

Jaguar fullback Rob Day had a fine night, scoring twice and gaining 138 yards on 31 carries. All of Falls Church's four scores were on the ground, as were 256 of its 300 yards gained.

Marshall had better luck in the air, with quarterback Mike Oliff going 13-for-24 for 127 yards and one touchdown, a 25-yard pass to Curt Midkiff.

Marshall Halts Drive To Save 14-7 Victory

Marshall held off two Mount Vernon efforts in the final minutes and escaped with a 14-7 victory in a Virginia AAA League nondistrict game last night at Mount Vernon.

Mount Vernon was stopped at the eight-yard line late in the fourth quarter following two incomplete passes. Marshall punted out and Mount Vernon regained the ball at midfield with 2:12 to play. The Majors' Randy Hinson completed one pass for a first down but then threw four straight incomplete passes.

Al Boudreau ran through right tackle, broke two tackles and darted 21 yards for Marshall's first touchdown, in the second quarter. The Statesmen took a 14-0 lead on a 69-yard pass play from Mike Oliff to Curt Midkiff. The same players combined for the extra points.

The victory had special meaning for Marshall coach Ed Henry, who returned to high-school coaching from the college ranks last season. He had coached championship teams at both Mount Vernon and Annandale. The Statesmen upset Annandale last week.

Marshall Grinds Down Annandale

Eldridge (Dinky) Jones gained 135 yards rushing, 104 in the first half, as Marshall's steady ground game prevailed over Annandale's passing attack, 12-7, in a Virginia AAA League nondistrict game last night at Marshall.

Jones' second quarter 15-yard touchdown run gave Marshall a 6-0 lead it maintained until Jones swept 14 yards for the rest of his team's points with less than three minutes to play.

George Knox threw 35 passes, completing 13 for 130 yards for Annandale but could not engineer a scoring drive until he hit Tom Fadden with a six-yard touchdown pass with 10 seconds remaining.

For Marshall coach Ed Henry, it was his first victory in his first game against the school he led to the top of Northern Virginia football before becoming an assistant at Virginia Military Institute. Bob Hardage, Annandale's current coach, was a player under Henry at Mount Vernon and an assistant to him at Annandale.

Coach's New Style Wins for Marshall

Ed Henry never was known as a radical innovator in his 10 years as coach at Annandale High School. He never had to be. His teams always ran over the opposition with a brutal, ground-oriented attack. It wasn't pretty, but it worked.

Henry compiled a 66-25-7 record before leaving in 1966

to take an assistant coaching job at Virginia Military. After two years, he came back to the high schools, this time as head coach at Marshall. And Henry no longer is content with conservative football.

His transformation into a sort of "radic-lib" of the Northern Virginia high school football scene has been instrumental in 12th-ranked Marshall's 6-1 record, six in a row since an opening game defeat to Falls Church.

Not Power Types

"We've got different type kids here," Henry said yesterday. "The boys were bigger at Annandale, we didn't take the percentage risks. Now, we've got to use speed, we just don't have the people to play power football."

Henry's thoroughly modern style was put on display twice against McLean Friday night, when the Statesmen completed two long passes, one for a touchdown, out of punt formation.

Henry also has been using an unusual number of underclassmen in key positions. His quarterback, Mike Oliff, and middle guard Mike Little, are sophomores.

And of course, Marshall has Dinky Jones, "a tough kid who plays as well or better under pressure than anyone I've ever coached," Henry said. Jones, a senior halfback, has gained 600 yards and scored 56 points in six of Marshall's seven games. "He's a heck of a kid to have on your side."

Secondary Does Well

Henry seems most proud of his defensive backfield, a group that "lived through a whole lot of hell last year" when Marshall was 2-8, but which has intercepted 13 passes in the last four games.

Marshall leads the Great Falls District with a 3-0 record and must face Fort Hunt in a nondistrict game Friday before taking on district opponents Langley and Madison in the last two weeks of the season.

Three more victories would assure Marshall a berth in the Northern Virginia regional championship game. In Virginia's complicated rating system, Marshall is ranked No. 2 behind undefeated Yorktown in Northern Virginia.

"We've got to win them all," Henry said, "But I'm not going to put any undue pressure on the kids. They've already done well, almost better than we expected. We still make mistakes, but they hustle like crazy to cover them up. And we've gotten better as we go along."

Boudreau Scores Sink Fort Hunt

Marshall Extends Streak to Seven

Al Boudreau scored two fourth-period touchdowns as Marshall extended its winning streak to seven games by defeating Fort Hunt, 12-0, last night in a Virginia AAA nondistrict game at Fort Hunt.

Marshall, vying for a berth in the regional playoff, drove 90 and 80 yards for its scores. Jay McKeever picked up 42 yards rushing on the first drive, which ended with an eight-yard run by Boudreau. Quarterback Mike Oliff completed three passes for 55 yards on the second, including a nine-yarder to Boudreau for the tally.

Fort Hunt did not advance inside Marshall's 20 during the game. Marshall is 7-1, Fort Hunt 3-4.

Marshall Downs Langley, Clinches Share of Crown

Dinky Jones scored on a three-yard run around right end with 3:08 left to give Marshall a 6-0 victory over Langley last night and clinch at least a tie for the Virginia AAA Great Falls District title.

It was Marshall's eighth straight victory after an opening game defeat and gave the Statesmen a 4-0 district record. Langley now is 2-1 in district play.

Jones' touchdown climaxed a 34-yard drive that started with seven minutes remaining following a 25-yard punt by Langley's Mike Carter.

Jones carried on five of the eight plays in the march, picked up 23 of the 74 yards he gained for the night. He bulled for a first down on fourth-and-one on the Langley 25 and then sped 11 yards to the five two plays later.

On second-and-goal from the three, sophomore quarterback Mike Oliff began an option play around right end and then pitched to Jones, who romped into the end zone unmolested.

Up to that time, the game had been a fierce defensive struggle with Langley holding the upper hand in the first half and Marshall dominating the second.

Marshall held the Saxons to just 42 total yards in the last half after Langley had amassed 118 in the opening two quarters. The Saxons, plagued by

terrible field positions, were able to cross the 50 just once after intermission, moving to the 42 before fumbling, and got past their own 30 only one other time.

But the Langley defense, led by tackle Mark Anderson and linebacker Jim Pendleton, stopped Marshall on the Saxons' 34 and 12 in the last half before the Statesmen finally scored.

Langley threatened once in the first half, on a drive that started on its own 45 after a punt. Phil Culbertson ran 25 yards and caught a pass for another 11 to give the Saxons a first down on the Marshall 17.

But the Statesmen defense, anchored by George Caras, Tom Haller and Mike and Dan Little, held as quarterback Steve Pournaras' fourth down pass from the 10 fell incomplete in the end zone.

Marshall Captures Great Falls Title

Ed Henry, the master builder of high-school football powers, celebrated another championship last night after his Marshall Statesmen trounced Madison, 36-8, and won the Virginia AAA Great Falls District title.

Henry, who coached champions at Mt. Vernon and Annandale previously, guided Marshall to its first Great Falls crown in just his second year at the school. The Statesmen were 2-8 last season but will take a 9-1 record and a nine-game winning streak into the Northern Regional play-off Nov. 28.

A rugged defense, led by George Caras, Jones Maley and Dan Little, was the architect of the victory last night. The Statesmen intercepted three passes and recovered two fumbles to set up four of their five touchdowns.

They also held Madison to minus 36 yards rushing, dropping Roger Neighborgall, the Warhawks quarterback, 16 times for minus 84 yards. Madison didn't cross the 50 until 73 seconds remained in the third quarter and scored its only touchdown with 2:47 left.

Dinky Jones, one of the few seniors on the Marshall team, punched over for three short touchdowns, all in the first half, rushed for 52 yards and caught three passes for 21 more. Sophomore quarterback Mike Oliff, a nifty ball handler, completed eight of 13 passes for 94 yards and handled Marshall's ball-control offense, which ran off 23 more plays than Madison, with aplomb.

Neighborgall, a fine drop-back passer, received horrible protection and was harrassed especially by middle guard Caras. Neighborgall completed only four of 13 passes for 61 yards.

5-Foot-9 Oliff Looms Large In Marshall Title Campaign

Mike Oliff hardly seemed the candidate to quarterback Marshall High School to a 9-1 season and the Great Falls District championship, when coach Ed Henry convened practice in mid-August.

Oliff, only a sophomore and worse, just 5-foot-9 and 135 pounds, was a second string quarterback for his freshman team, hardly the material to build dreams, or championships, on.

Oliff had other ideas. And he'll be the starting quarterback Saturday when Marshall meets Edison for the Virginia AAA Northern Regional championship at Woodson High.

"He's an exceptional kid,"

Henry said yesterday. "Our whole program hinged on finding a quarterback who could lead. We put him on offense, we put a lot of pressure on him. We run the option, and we didn't have anyone experienced. Either he came through, or we were in bad shape."

Other than Marshall's opening game loss to Falls Church, Oliff has had few problems directing the attack. He's a 51 per cent passer and has thrown for nine touchdowns and over 800 yards.

"He's smart," Henry said. "We've gone for games without calling a play. We help him a

little bit, but we haven't shuttled plays in at all. And he's just turned 15."

Oliff, meanwhile, plays down his contribution to Marshall's success. "Our running backs, Dinky Jones and Al Boudreau, and the new offense the coaches put in really help us," he said.

"And I'm just fortunate coach Henry gave me the chance to play. He's given me the confidence I didn't have when the season started. And the guys really made me feel good. They acted like I was on their level even though they were older. We all functioned as a team, and there's no difference on or off the field."

Edison, Marshall Meet For Northern Crown

Edison and Marshall, two teams whose goals three months ago were "respectability," meet for the Virginia AAA Northern Regional championship today at 1:30 p.m. at Woodson High School.

Marshall coach Ed Henry kept the faith with a group that won two games in 1969, threw in a sophomore quarterback

and a triple-option offense, and saw his team roll to a 9-1 record and the Great Falls District title.

Edison's Blaine Morton stayed with fundamental, grind-it-out football after a 4-6 record last season and came up with a devastating running attack as Edison finished 8-2 and captured the Gunston title.

There will be few passes thrown today, both coaches predict, with most of the action coming off tackle, over the middle or around the ends.

Trapping Team

"We're basically a trapping, off-tackle football team," said Morton. "We only threw the ball 109 times this year. I believe in fundamentals."

Edison's multi-talented backfield of Doug McBroom (657 yards), Page Thompson (346) and Jay Chesley (239) must contend with a Marshall defense that hasn't allowed more than one touchdown in the Statesmen's nine victories. Marshall has four shutouts.

Chesley, an All-Metropolitan defensive back, is Edison's do-everything man. He was the leading scorer with 58 points, including nine touchdowns, returned kickoffs and punts, and even found time to catch 21 passes and intercept seven.

"If there's a better all-around back in the Metropolitan area, I'd like to see him," said Morton.

Partial to Jones

Henry, meanwhile, is a bit partial to Dinky Jones, his own version of the All-America boy. Jones has scored 72 points and gained over 800 yards, despite missing two games with injuries. Sophomore quarterback Mike Oliff can throw, if the running game bogs down. He has nine touchdown passes.

Edison has a decided edge physically, particularly in the line. "There isn't anyone in the region as small as we are over all," said Henry. "On the other hand, our strength has been our speed, plus our attitude."

"The kids are still young. They've got a lot more poise than this team should have, even though it's still exasperating at times," Henry said. "But heck, I can't complain."

Marshall Defeats Edison

Marshall, the puniest football team in Northern Virginia, took a physical beating in every area but the scoreboard and captured the Virginia AAA Northern Regional championship with a 26-2 victory over Edison yesterday at Woodson High.

The victory was Marshall's 10th straight after an opening-game loss to Falls Church, and earned coach Ed Henry the coveted regional title in his second year at the Falls Church school.

Edison, outweighing the Statesmen almost 15 pounds to the man, forced three Marshall starters to the sidelines with injuries before the contest was over. In fact, their aggressive tactics probably cost the Eagles the football game.

Three of Marshall's four touchdowns were aided by personal-foul calls, either for late contact or face-mask violations, and the Eagles committed seven major penalties for 89 yards.

Defense Stops Eagles

Marshall's undersized defense also had a hand in the final outcome, stopping two Eagle drives with critical tackles on fourth down situation.

Led by middle guard George Caras, defensive tackle Dan Little and defensive end Joe Coates, Marshall held the Eagles to 62 yards total offense.

Edison had the lead only once, in the first quarter when Marshall quarterback Mike Oliff, rolling out from his own five, pitched back to a non-existent halfback in his own end zone. The ball rolled out of the end zone before Edison's Mike Updegraff could chase it down, and the Eagles were awarded a safety.

Late in the quarter Edison marched to Marshall's 41, but Coates tackled quarterback Greg Olsen for no gain on fourth and inches to go and the Statesmen took over.

Jones Scores on Pass

Five plays, 48 yards and one personal foul call put the ball on Edison's 11, from where Oliff connected on a floating pass to Dinky Jones, who took it on the left sideline at the three and stumbled in for the first of his two touchdowns.

Marshall took the opening kickoff of the second half 60 yards in six plays, with Al Boudreau going 10 yards for

the score. That drive also was aided by a face-mask call that gave Marshall a first and goal at the 10. Boudreau carried for 37 yards in the drive.

Edison had its deepest penetration of the day on the next series, grinding it out to the Marshall 39. But Little dropped Olsen for a nine-yard loss on fourth and 10, and again Marshall took over.

The Statesmen, with Boudreau picking up 33 of Mar-

shall's 52 yards, added a third score when Jones swept right end with a pitchout from eight yards out. Edison was guilty of another flagrant foul for piling on Boudreau the play before Jones' touchdown run.

Edison's Carl Kersey managed to block a Marshall punt early in the fourth quarter and teammate Greg Prohaska recovered at the Statesmen's 13. But the Eagles were guilty of holding and Marshall was

called for a face-mask violation, offsetting the recovery and killing any comeback hopes.

Mike Little, a sophomore member of Marshall's ferocious secondary, intercepted Olsen's desperation pass a few minutes later and ran 34 yards for Marshall's final touchdown.

The contest was terribly frustrating for Edison, and particularly flanker Jay Ches-

ley, an All-Metropolitan selection at safety. Marshall allowed Olsen only eight completions in 21 attempts, and Chesley caught only two passes for 13 yards.

The futility of it all finally got to Chesley in the fourth quarter when, after Olsen overthrew him on the sideline, he turned around and smacked a Marshall defender and was ejected.

Edison did manage to inter-

cept five of Oliff's passes, but they were unable to contain Boudreau, who gained 80 yards in 13 carries before being injured at the end of the third quarter. The Eagles finished the season 8-3.
