Brent Brenneman Barner was born on Monday, 19 September 1955 at [Community Hospital, Glen Cove, Nassau County, New York](#). He was the son of [Richard LongBarner](#) and [Geneva Arline Ingram](#). His Social Security Number was issued in [Washington, DC](#). Brent married, at the age of 33 [Elizabeth Apil Omengan](#), daughter of [Rafel gpad Omengan](#) and [Eliza Apil](#), on Tuesday, 30 May 1989 at [Honolulu, Honolulu County, Hawaii](#). Brent attended Antioch College for his undergraduate degree in communications and earned his M.A. and Ph.D. in political science at the East/West Center of the University of Hawaii, where his wife also earned her Ph. D. in cultural geography. Brent's disseration analyzed health delivery systems in selected countries around the world. His career included working for the State of Hawaii (the Hawaiian Legislature) as a policy researcher to review proposed new laws, taught at the University of the Philippines at Los Banos as a sociologist, and most recently worked for the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, D.C. to plan surplus food distribution throughout the nation.

Brent was an outstanding member of our Barner clan; displaying an understanding and diplomatic personality with an unique keen intelligence. Brent was very much liked and admired and the many responses to

notifications of his demise were glowingly impressive. He died after a year and a half long battle with colon / liver cancer on Thursday, 3 April 2003 at the age of 47 years, 6 months and 15 days at [Hospice of Northern Virginia, Arlington, Virginia](#). He was cremated according to his last wishes, His ashes were dispersed on the Potomac River shortly after his death. He and his family, who lived in Hawaii and the Philippines for all those years (his son was born in Hawaii and only knew life on an island until a couple of years ago when they moved to Virginia), decided water would be a fitting reminder of his life and a way to reconnect to him anywhere in the world.
