The JV basketball team raised it's record to 3-4 with an impressive 72-26 romp over Washington-Lee and a 50-48 win over Oakton. High scorers in the Washington-Lee game were Steve Vandiver, Greg Dunn, and Steve Placek, who scored 12 points each. Placek also shared the honor with Tim O'Toole in the Oakton game, both players getting 11 points.

The Varsity basketball team was not as successful as their JV counterparts. The team dropped a 67-55 decision to Jashington-Lee, then lost a 54-53 heartbreaker in the final second of play to Oakton. When Coach Bob Smith was asked to comment on the final seconds of the Oakton game, he replied, "As near as I can tell, Mike Oliff lost his balance as he was beginning to dribble the ball. He lost control and John Behrens picked it up and scored."

Student-Teacher Relationships:

Since good student-teacher relationships enhance learning, we strive to achieve inter-personal relationships based on mutual respect, understanding, and tolerance of both students and teachers as individuals.

Discipline:

Regulations concerning behavior are designed to establish and to maintain a learning environment wherein student, faculty and school personnel can feel safe and comfortable. The goal of disciplinary action taken by both teachers and administrators is oriented toward improving beth behavior and attitude in the most appropriate manner possible rather than merely avenging misconduct. Teachers and administrators encourage self-discipline by communicating their approval and by giving recognition to the students who demonstrate self-discipline.

Marshall High School students are treated as full-fledged citizens; the basic rights guaranteed to citizens by the Constitution are not abridged for students.

Co-Curricular Activities:

George C. Marshall High School offers a variety of co-curricular activities to augment present courses and to add new areas of interest. These voluntary non-credit activities exist to meet student needs, promote social interaction, develop creativity, and assist in making the form mal curricular a more rewarding experience.

Curriculum:

Since the basic goal of the school is the fullest development of the whole person, every effort is made to offer a curriculum comprehensive enough, and flexible enough, to meet both present and future demands.

While curriculum remains the responsibility of the staff, it is policy and practice to increase community and student participation in its creation and evaluation, to such a degree that the curriculum best serves the students needs for learning that are not only relevant and functional, but also imaginative, creative, and humanistic.

Evaluation:
Evaluation of the effort and progress of each individual is based primarily upon his own performance as related to those behavioral objectives set forth in any given course of study. Effort is made to utilize evaluation as a useful feedback mechanism to the student and not simply as a reward/punishment device.

School Plant:

George C. Marshall was designed to accommodate the basic purposes of high schools by providing instruction in the academic courses, vocational training, and physical education. Recognizing the students' need for more social interaction

outside the classroom, George C. Marshall provides space for informal meetings, music, art, hobbies, and athletics.

Attempting to create the optimum learning situation, students, faculty, and administrators cooperate in providing the undisturbed conditions when necessary for study and teaching.... at the same time providing as much freedom and as extensive a scope of activities as possible.
