Experimental Substitute Plan Tried

Having permanent substitutes is an experimental idea in Fairfax County this year. Under the Teacher Replacement Pool plan, permanent substitutes have been hired on a regular basis to fill in for absent teachers. Under the plan, a teacher who re-signs or is ill indefinitely can be re-

signs or is ill indefinitely can be re-placed by the permanent substitute. Twenty permanent substitutes are employed by the county, ten for intermediate and high schools and ten for elementary schools. The sub-stitutes are on the payroll of their home school but may be called upon to teach at any other intermediate or high school in their division.

perts to be the cornerstone of the United States' foreign aid program. Dr. Pogue's military works earned him the following meritorious citation from the U. S. Army in 1964: "Dr. Pogue's many achievements in the field of military history, his knowledge of military affairs, and his standards of historical scholarship have been of inestimable benefit to the United States Army.'

World War II Combat Journalist

As a combat historian during World War II he was, for a while, with the First Army in the European Theater of Operations from Omaha Beach to Pilzen, Czechoslovakia. He received several U. S. medals and the French Croix de Guerre. His journalistic assignments took him to cover the Nor-mandy invasion, the Allied entry into Paris, the north flank of the Ardennes, the capture of Leipzig, and the meeting with the Russians at Torgau.

Among Dr. Pogue's eight major books have been the first two of a four-volume series on General Marshall's life: Education of a General Marshall biographer, will speak and Ordeal and Hope. He is currently this year's graduation June 9.




