Franklin's Future Looks Like a Blur

John (Jay) Franklin pitched a one-hitter for Madison High School Tuesday night and struck out 14 Marshall batters. Jay Franklin's grandmother, who watches him intently from behind home plate, said, "He isn't sharp tonight."

Franklin, with a 24-1 record in four years at Madison—his only defeat was this year

to Herndon, 2-1—often does better than a "meager" 14 strikeouts in a seven-inning game. In 65 innings this season the senior righthander has an eye-popping 161 strikeouts. Only 34 of his outs have not been strikeouts.

Athletic director Herbert Yost of Marshall calls Franklin "the best pitcher in Northern Virginia—at least."

Everyone familiar with his accomplishments, a perfect game, a no-hitter, several one-hitters and especially his blur-like fast ball, particularly conspicuous in a high-school game, assumes he will be drafted by the pros.

Franklin, close to 6-foot-3 and 185 pounds, is dignified, stylish, even arrogant while pitching, but face-to-face he has a Huck Finn quality—lean, very quiet and shy. He says he wants to play professionally, has planned for it for

a long time. "The only thing I like besides baseball is fishing. I could fish all day."

Franklin comes from a baseball family that supports his plans. His grandfather, Floyd Tuthill, was in baseball for 30 years, organizing teams in the Washington area. His father, John Franklin Sr., gave his son a glove and bat at the age of one year, but had to stop catching him by his sophomore year in high school. "I couldn't hold him anymore."

Franklin's trademark is his effort. One opposing player who came to watch him pitch, expecting to meet him in the Northern Virginia Regional playoff, said, "He throws every pitch as though his life depended on it."

With a 6-0 lead against Marshall he walks around the mound summoning energy between pitches, then coils in his delivery and shows his teeth when he throws. By the last inning it is 11-0, the game is won, but he still throws his hardest as though working toward a more difficult goal than winning or even striking out nearly every batter.

The Madison team, a power every season, amassing a 212-52 record in 17 years under coach Tom Christie, now takes its cue for extra effort from Franklin.

Second-string catcher Mark Sullivan, 5-7, 120 pounds with long hair coming out of his helmet, catches Franklin's pitches, which most men in the stands wouldn't touch, like it was the easiest thing in the world.

At bat, with Madison cruising behind Franklin, 7-0, Sullivan leans into an inside pitch, lets it hit his helmet squarely and ricochet over the backstop. The crowd gasps; Sullivan trots to first without shaking his head and steals second.

Marshall's Smith 1-Ups Bechtelheimer 1-Hitter

Ray Smith pitched a no-hitter as Marshall defeated Herndon, 2-0, yesterday at Marshall. Smith's effort was just slightly better than opposing pitcher Rusty Bechtelheimer, who gave up a single to the leadoff man in the bottom of the first and then held the winners hitless.

Marshall scored twice in the first after Gary Smerdzinski delivered the game's only hit and scored on some shoddy Herndon fielding.

Lyndon Carter pitched a seven-hitter, with eight strikeouts, and singled in the winning run in Yorktown's 4-3 victory over Wakefield last night in the final game of Virginia AAA Potomac District tournament at Simpson Stadium. Yorktown meets regular-season champion Wakefield again today with the winner advancing to the regional tournament.

Kovarik has connected for a team high 16 hits in 34 trips to the plate for a .471 average. He has also stolen a team high 10 bases.

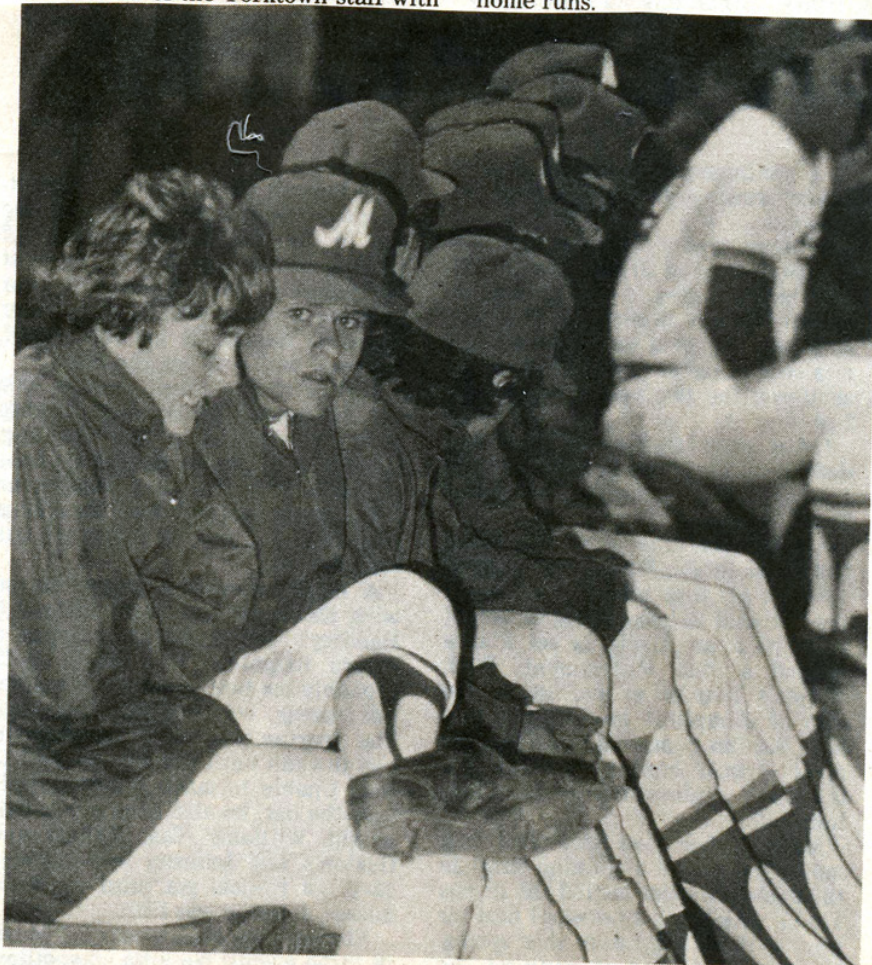
Randy Connor, who pitched a no-hitter against Madison Saturday, is the leader of the Yorktown staff with

Marshall Reverses

Early Form

After losing four of their first five games, the Marshall Statesmen have unleashed a batting barrage that toppled five straight Great Falls District opponents by a combined score of 37-10 through Friday.

Sophomore Tommy Davis, a starting pitcher who also leads the team in batting with a .476 average, explains that, "Just thinking about losing when we knew we had the best team in the league turned us around."

Davis is one of the key players in Marshall's hopes for a district title. In addition to leading the team with his .476 average for 10 hits in 21 at bats as well as in triples and hits, Davis recorded 29 strikeouts in 22 1/3 innings of pitching through Friday's showdown with Washington-Lee.

As a freshman a year ago, Davis posted a 4-1 record with the Marshall varsity. He is the only pitcher on the Statesmen's staff with previous varsity pitching experience. Marshall catcher Jeff Bush claims "Davis can be one of the best pitchers in the area if he wants to be."

Despite its lack of experience, the Marshall pitching staff has a combined 2.40 earned run average. Bush's experience behind the plate is one of the major factors for the development of the relatively inexperienced group of hurlers. They

express complete confidence in his judgment.

"Jeff has caught a lot of good pitchers before," says Craig Burlingame. "He can tell when a pitcher is going bad." Jim Day expresses agreement. "I always listen to Jeff," Day said, "He calls the pitches because he knows the hitters."

Not only does Bush use his experience as a catcher, but he is also one of the big guns in Marshall's offensive attack. He is the power man in the line-up, as evidenced by his two home runs and four doubles among his 10 hits.

Craig Burlingame, a junior in his first year of varsity ball, has been one of the most reliable pitchers on the Statesmen staff. Although his record is only 2-2, his earned run average is a sparkling 1.99. "When you're a pitcher the main thing is control," said Burlingame. His two walks per game average backs up this philosophy.

The Statesmen faced McLean, at that time the district leader, in a crucial contest last week. Burlingame responded with a near-perfect performance as he held the Highlanders to a scratch single and a walk in winning, 5-1.

McLean's lone run came when, after an error and a sacrifice fly, a Highlander looped a fly to centerfield. Mike Culhane, the Marshall centerfielder, tried for a diving catch and managed to get his glove on the ball. The impact of hitting the ground, however, knocked the ball out of his glove and the no-hitter and shut-out were lost.

Day made the varsity as an outfielder, but Marshall coach Jimmie Miller converted the 6-foot-2, 200 pounder to a pitcher. The conversion came just in time for the Statesmen who, as a result of earlier rained out games, were forced to play five consecutive games over the Easter holidays.

Day came through with victories over Herndon and W-L. Day's best pitches are a fastball and a screwball. He has fanned 16 men in his 10 innings on the mound. "I guess I try to keep them off balance," said Day. If he develops a good curve ball, he

could become one of the area's top strike out artists.

While Bush lends his experience to the pitching staff, senior second baseman Gary Smerdzinski steadies the infield. Smerdzinski is also in his third year of varsity competition and he is talented at bat as well as in the field.

His .310 batting average is a big asset to the team. He also leads the team in stolen bases.

Smerdzinski, however, suffered a sprained ankle recently and was forced to sit out several key games.

Fortunately for Marshall, "our bench strength is fantastic," Smerdzinski says. Mike Miller came off the bench to bang out a pair of doubles the first game that Smerdzinski missed.

Larry Caynor, a .300 hitter, holds down first base for the Statesmen. Caynor leads the team in at-bats and runs scored. He also plays a sound defensive game. Blair Flynn and senior Mike Morina play third base and short stop for Marshall. Together, they give Marshall a combination of sound infield play and leadership.
